Course Description	The goal of this course is to provide comprehensive knowledge of the legal system and its operation, the most fundamental concepts of legal dogmas (e.g. law, legal norms, sources of law, rules of law, legislation, law enforcement).  The focus will be on the analysis of the contact points of law and politics, including the social creations that are in the most direct relationship with law with special regard to the presentation of the contact points between law and the political organisations of the state.  In addition to basic legal concepts, students will be given a review of the most general problems of the philosophy of law that concern everyday society: e.g. law and justice, compliance with the law, the role of common law, efficiency and interpretation of laws.

Course Description	The goal of the course is to provide students with a sound basis for finding their way in the different areas of statistics and among the various analytical tools.  After reviewing the structure of databases and the types of variables, they will learn about the basic statistical tools. Starting with the study of the mean, variance, and distribution of variables we will look at the frequency row, its modified rows and the histogram, followed by a general study of the analysis of relationships. We discuss in detail association, mixed and correlations relations followed by statistical estimates and verifying hypotheses as part of deductive statistics. Finally, we will discuss linear regression as a modelling statistic.

## Course Description

This subject will span two semesters and discuss international relations after the Second World War, that is, the history of the Cold War, broken down into different topics. This kind of approach – which is otherwise not common –presupposes that each of the topics to be discussed is taken as a coherent whole: we will refer to the beginnings – in some cases going back to the 19th century –, contemporary facts, events and development, which we will then analyse against the international reality of our age (e.g. the notion of "crimes against humanity "was introduced during the Nuremberg trials but it was used for several massacre which occurred in the 1990s, e.g. in Rwanda, the former Yugoslavia.) The first semester will focus on the evolution of antagonistic military and political blocs, the great international crises of the Cold War as well as the issues of detente and disarmament. The second semester will be devoted to the inner disintegration of these blocs, issues discussed at the Helsinki Conference, and then the analysis of the problems stemming from the dissolution of the Soviet Union and its consequences. Next, we will turn our attention to special region struck by crises, the Middle East, starting with the establishment of the state

### Course Description

Every time we turn on the radio or television, every time we open a book, magazine, or newspaper, someone is trying to educate us, to convince us to buy a product, to persuade us to vote for a candidate or to subscribe to some version of what is right, true, or beautiful. Persuasion, or by the same token, arousing fear - which is another, might be said the negative form of persuasion - are the essence of social communication and were present from the very beginning in the history of the "social animal". We will concentrate on case studies, analysing different types of social communication, in different historical circumstances that will stretch into our modern era. Our examples or famous occurrences will include the so called "Melian Dialogue" recorded by Thukydides 2500 years ago, Machivelli's infamous advice to the Prince, propaganda as conceived by its most notorious exponent, Joseph Goebbels in the Nazi era, "fighting words" doctrine in US's constitutional interpretation, political communication of hatred, and beheading of innocent individuals as the most extreme form of communication practised by terrorists. Some of these examples are obviously very disturbing and raise highly controversial issues, which are worth to be discussed by the students.

Course Description	The course deals with the United States of America from two, though y inseparable perspectives. This is not a history lecture, but rather focuses on the specifics - the historical context is explored through the required and recommended literature and the films to be watched. The focus is on the nature and functioning of American democracy. The first description of American democracy was given to us by Alexis de Tocqueville, and the study of this work is therefore essential. Although Montesquieu is the source of the division of powers theory, the American constitutional system of checks and balances differs from the original proposal in many respects. The decisions of the US Supreme Court are crucial to the functioning of democracy, and we will therefore also analyze landmark decisions relating to the Bill of Rights, which owes much to John Locke's political philosophy. American politics is to a large extent centered on the President. We must therefore familiarize ourselves with at least a few presidents: Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln, Woodrow Wilson, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, Donald Trump Federalism, the electoral system can also be classified in what we might call the political perspective.  The social perspective is also inexhaustibly rich. Here, too, we can only attempt to highlight certain problems. Tocqueville already expressed his admiration for the diversity of American social life and, above all, for the multiplicity of autonomies (individuals, associations, media), but in the last 150 years or so the scope of social freedom seems to have narrowed. This narrowing could be better described as partisanship and radicalization, accelerated and deepened by social media, political micro-targeting, in short, by the Digital Age, which is creating social divides.

Course Description	The course aims to examine the political geography and modern history of the states of the Balkan Peninsula, in the period between the 18 <sup>th</sup> and 20 <sup>th</sup> centuries. Although it is not a history class, it uses a historical perspective in order to provide a better understanding of the region's complexities. Given that the Balkans can be interpreted as an area where the geopolitical interests of various regional and global actors have clashed, the course puts special emphasis on the analysis of the role that the region was playing in a wider context of international relations during the aforementioned period. This is complemented by the thorough investigation of the political, economic and cultural developments that were taking place within the region. The course consequently deals with a wide set of issues, including the slow demise of the Ottoman Empire, the regional interests of the Russian Empire, the formation of nation states in the Balkans, the relevant developments during the two world wars, the internal and foreign policies of regional states during the Cold War, and the painful breakup of Yugoslavia. The lectures' theoretical approach will be complemented by exercises, that students will have to carry out in the form of in-class presentations. Fulfilling the course will give

Course Description	This course is a general overview of Latin American history from the beginning of the 19th century to the present, providing students with familiarity with the region and preparing them for future, more specialized studies with a focus on history. While Latin America is united by a common history of Spanish and Portuguese imperialism, it is also an incredibly diverse region. In this course, we will focus on the history of a continent that was established after a colonial period and with even the most ancient cultural heritage. During the 19th century, South American countries won their independence from Spain and Portugal, and the search for the identity of the nation-states emerging from the remnants of the colonies gave rise to further conflicts. They fought numerous wars with each other for territory, sea access, resources, or national prestige. During the 20th century, military dictatorships took power in many countries of the continent, which were only replaced by democratically elected governments towards the end of the 20th century. After the economic boom, progressive social policy and the integration efforts of South America in the 2010s, the concept of "crisis" describes the reality of the continent the most. Whereas before it seemed that the expanding middle class and the diversifying economic structure makes Brazil and some others in the region an important player in the 21th century, by the second decade of the century these hopes faded. Nowadays, terms such as the "captive state", the "petro-state" or the "narco-state" became popular. The common starting point is the assumption of a structural problem, which is political and economic weakness. Besides the traditional perspectives, the course also offers a

International Studies in Practice is an academic collaborative trainee project course where students work with companies, NGOs or other governmental or supranational institutions for a minimum of 30 days long period. During the programme they reflect and analyse typical procedures of international relation building, and societal or institutional issues presented by the University of Pecs or the cooperating organisational partners. During the programme students need to use their area-specific and multidisciplinary background in International Studies as well as their research capabilities to assist both their adopting institution as well as the University of Pecs. This course teaches students to merge their International Studies background in practice. Students learn to conduct holistic research using their multidisciplinary grounding, that is, historical, cultural, economic, and political—as taught from a Humanities perspective, and area expertise while developing the skills to be able to work at an inter- or multinational environment.

### Course Description

The aim of the subject is to help students write their theses, apply their theoretical and methodological knowledge in practice, and finally, to prepare them for PhD training.

During the semester, the thesis supervisor helps students find their research topics, identify research problems, formulate research questions, and come up with a (praxis oriented) research plan. The supervisor also helps students choose their sources, collect, and analyse their data, find the sufficient theoretical frameworks, and find and critically interpret relevant theoretical and thematic literature. In addition, (s)he also shows students the ethical aspects of doing research.

Methods: the course builds on the methodological skills and disciplinary knowledge students have acquired during their training. The research seminar is led by the teacher of the student's own choice, who help the students write a coherent scientific text that meets the requirements of the discipline. During the semester, students are expected to regularly consult their supervisors and report on their progress in collecting and analysing source material, discuss relevant works and theoretical frameworks, and present chapters of the thesis.

The course will enable students to identify and sensitively handle environmental and social issues. It develops ethical sensitivity and an ability to think complexly about environmental and social issues. It also increases students' competency in understanding scientific literature and writing

In certain training programmes, the curriculum prescribes a 30-credit curriculum block, a so-called specialization module. Students are allowed to choose a specialization (module) offered by their own training programme. For international relations BA students the options for specializations are

- European Integration Specialisations
- International Relations

Application procedure of selections usually happens in III. semester, and its education begin from IV. semester. Further information will be shared accordingly with those, who are eligible for module selection.

### **Immigration issues**

If you are a **third-country** national can obtain a residence permit for the purpose of studies who

- enrols or has enrolled in a public education institution registered as operating in the public education information system for full-time school education, or according to the working schedule of full-time education, or
- studies within the framework of full-time training at a state-recognized higher education institution or a licensed foreign higher education institution operating in Hungary,
- and wishes to stay in Hungary in order to participate in the preparatory training organized by the higher education institution.
